Their recruitment processes are also set up to allow 'favoured' individuals to progress while newcomers and outliers can easily be kept from progressing. HR lack a bredth of professional experience to understand acceptable and modern practice. They are also afraid of the and prioritise "protecting the "over individual staff members."
